Well, I'm back!

And can I say – what a privilege it is to be back at Christ Church, and I thank the church for giving me the opportunity to have a second opportunity to serve here. It has been such a pleasure to work with the church officers, and such a positive PCC, and I thank you all. The office staff are a joy to be with, and serve our church faithfully, (and Okey has learned to cope with my sense of humour - perhaps it was a bit unkind to tell him to hop upstairs when he injured his foot). Where would we be without them? The compound staff, likewise, go over and beyond the call of duty, and we have much to thank them for. Evelyn has joined the team as children's worker, with great enthusiasm. All in all, a great team to be with!

It is also encouraging to see much new lay ministry developing. Having so many people involved in the work of our church gives us a firm foundation to build for the future. If the church is to grow, not everything can be funnelled through the vicar or office.

So what does it feel like to be back? Well, as they say in Thailand: "same same, but different". The same familiar feel to the church; the same sense of vibrancy in the worship; the same international feel which is what gives our worship its energy and buzz; the same practical concern for the needs of all members, expressed in the amount of care that we offer to asylum seekers. But different: on my arrival, I looked out at a new congregation – many faces that I did not recognise and many "old" faces no longer in Bangkok; the video screens finally in place; inevitably, the church has moved on.

So what is the nature of Christ Church? We truly are a sharing community. We receive from all the world; we give back to all the world. We have a unique ministry, an opportunity to share in the work of building God's universal kingdom. It is so good to see this ministry continuing and growing.

But what can I, personally, do in an incumbency of just nine months? I can keep the show on the road – ensure that Sunday worship is delivered to a high standard (easy when we have such committed musicians); keep the seasons of the church – and what a joyful Christmas we shared, and a sure vindication for the decision to celebrate the carol service midweek. We were uncertain when we took the decision, but there was no sensible Sunday available and a congregation of 500+ on a Wednesday evening was a real highlight of December. And we have just marked Holy Week and Easter – encouraging attendance at our services, but personally, a privilege to be able to co-ordinate one more major festival season before I am finally put out to pasture on the "retired vicar" circuit.

But surely, in nine months, I can do more than simply maintain the status quo? My aim is to leave the church in good shape for a new, permanent vicar. My broad theme for preaching has been "growing in discipleship". Every Sunday, the weekly theme has focussed on one aspect of what it means to be a follower of Jesus Christ. We need to be aware of our ever-changing community in Christ Church, so it is essential that we revisit the basics of what it means to be a Christian on a regular basis, with opportunities to respond, so there have been sermons on believing, redemption, faithfulness; there have been sermons about prayer, the meaning of the Eucharist; but there have also been

sermons encouraging us to think about the implications of our faith – to move on and grow in faith and to consider: how do we live as disciples of Jesus Christ in the 21st century? We share in a timeless faith.

During May, I will be offering a short course on discipleship based on Paul's Letter to the Ephesians. Here, Paul spells out the basics of our faith – what it means to be saved “by grace through faith” and then he addresses the big “therefore” questions – if this is what we believe, then, this is how we should live. It's a very rich book, and I hope you will engage with it. I hope to run the course on Sunday lunchtimes, and in a mid-week session.

We will also be holding a Day of Prayer for our church – Saturday 16th May. You will be able to participate in person, by Zoom, with a bit of support on WhatsApp, or simply in the comfort of your own home, wherever that may be. I do hope you will engage with it.

And we will also mark Pentecost – May 24th, as International Sunday (a new festival that the PCC has just invented). We invite church members to bring sample dishes of food from their home countries and communities, to an international “Bring and Share” lunch.

Another source of joy has been to share in worship with our friends in the Thai Church. We have shared Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services. and have had the opportunity to meet together during Lent to learn something about our respective mission outreach programmes, a joint visit to Shalem House being a highlight. I hope that these meetings offer some insight into how we can work and share together. and be the Body of Christ. I have been invited to share early morning devotions with the staff of RCDC, and we pray for the Thai Church as it establishes new worship centres across Thailand and celebrates the completion of the church at Lat Krabang.

And another joy – tempered with sadness by the need to still be supporting there – has been to revisit our Karen ministry. If you have never up to visit Noh Bo, I encourage you to make the trip. There is nothing like actually being there to catch the vision. It will change you.

Looking forwards, Christ Church does face challenges, I will keep you in my prayers as you move forwards. The renovations needed to our church building represent a massive challenge, but also a great opportunity to make Christ Church known across the city. The works are essential to ensure that we continue to stand as a witness to God for the next 120 years.

And within our fellowship, we need to develop our range of small groups and discipleship programmes. We appreciate the Alpha Course, the Wednesday afternoon study group and the Zoom group, but we need more groups! An in person midweek evening group is the least that we need to establish if we wish to attract new members and build disciples. I hope that the Ephesians course will provide a “stop gap” solution, to this question, but I pray that something more permanent will grow out of it.

After Easter, I have just two more months to spend with you. Then I will fade back into retirement obscurity in northern England. It is my prayer that these can be positive months and that together, we will continue to “be” Christ’s church.

Thank you for your partnership in the Gospel.

I pray for a good and positive future for our church.

Treasurer's Report 2025

Treasurer's Statement

By the Grace of God, Christ Church's finances strengthened in 2025. At the church operations level (1.35), there was a surplus of 1.6m THB driven by increases in Total Income (1.12) to 13.1m THB with Total Offerings (1.4) to 7.1m THB, up 17%, and contributions for occasional services (1.6), amounting to 0.7m THB. Total expenses (1.34) were well-managed at 11.4m THB, 4% lower than budget. In contrast, the Karen Ministry (3.11) saw a deficit of 1.4m THB although almost two-thirds of this was related to (already allocated) cash outflows for the Volunteer House project.

With respect to funds obtained for the use of the Old Vicarage, the Sinking Fund was topped up to 4.8m THB while the amount put aside for the Youth/Assistant Pastor recruitment has risen to 2.4m THB.

The financial outlook for 2026 remains cautiously positive. The 2026 Budget is operationally steady with a minor increase in income (1%) and decrease in expenses (1%) compared to 2025, opening up a budgeted surplus of 0.4m THB for the full year. Most figures have been maintained at 2025 levels although the Repairs and Maintenance budget has been increased to reflect higher expected needs associated with an ageing compound.

Significant capital expenditures (1.4m THB) are budgeted for 2026 mostly around renovation of the toilets and Li Hall ceiling. The Karen Ministry will see the remainder of the cost outlay for construction of the Volunteer House (2.8 m THB).

As I expect we are all aware, the most significant financial issue in the near to mid-term will be the restoration of the church sanctuary. This will be addressed as a standalone initiative separate from our operational finances.

As always, I would like to take the opportunity to thank, on behalf of the PCC, all those who have supported the finance work in the past year and especially Khun Panjit for her hard work and patience.

Financials Details

Income

Total income of 13,081,503 THB (1.12) in 2025 was 9% above budget and 15% above the 2024 figure. General Offerings (1.1) of 5,758,238 THB were 10% above previous year while other income (1.3) was also above budget with a Gift Day contribution of 334,002 THB. Occasional church services (1.6) have evolved into a significant source of income, reaching 709,500 THB for the year.

Expenses

Total expenses for Christ Church (1.34) in 2025 were 11,436,774 THB which is 4% below budget and 6% below last year. The largest expense item, employment (1.13), at 5,595,306 THB was slightly (4%) above budget, mainly due to one-off relocation costs. Other items above budget included repairs and maintenance at 821,842 THB (37% over) and insurance at 160,558 THB which more than doubled due to the cycle of premium renewal. Most other expenses including travel, utilities, children's ministry and hospitality, were close to or significantly below budget. The Outreach figure was higher than budget as this included refugee contingency payments.

CCB Surplus

The resulting surplus at CCB Operations level (1.35) amounted to 1,644,729 THB for 2025.

CCB Compound Projects

There was limited movement on Compound projects with only 62% of the allocated 267,000 THB being used.

Karen Ministry

The Karen Ministry reported a deficit of 1,356,416 THB (3.11) for 2025. The majority of donations (70%) totaling 2,111,421 THB (3.6) came from CCB members. Staff costs (3.7) were 1,279,300 THB and Operational costs (3.8) 1,297,826 THB were well managed to be below budget overall. Work was started on the Volunteer House project, with Project expenses (3.9) totaling 890,712 THB. Adjusting for this, the deficit stood at 655,240 THB. The overall funds for the Karen Ministry stand at 9,855,381 THB which amounts to around 30 months' worth of running costs after accounting for the amount ringfenced for the Volunteer House project.

Sinking Fund and Youth Ministry

The Sinking Fund for the maintenance of the Old Vicarage building was topped up back to 4.8m THB at the end of 2025. In addition, the amount put aside for the Youth Ministry Fund stood at 2.4 million THB.

Overall Financial Position

As at end of year, church assets stood at 31.5m THB. Provisioning and allocations for various items and contingencies totaled 24.0m THB (the major items being 3.0m THB for air-conditioning replacement, 9.9m THB for the Karen Ministry, 4.8m THB for the RCDC Sinking Fund as well as 3.0m THB as a general contingency fund). As a result, Christ Church has cash availability of 7.5m THB for day-to-day operations which is equivalent to around 7.5 months of operating expenses.

2026 Financial Outlook

The financial outlook for 2026 remains cautiously positive. The 2026 Budget is operationally steady with a minor increase in income (1%) and decrease in expenses (1%), opening up a budgeted surplus of 397,376 THB for the full year. Most figures have been maintained at 2025 levels although the Repairs and Maintenance budget has been increased to reflect higher expected needs associated with an ageing compound.

Significant capital expenditures are budgeted for 2026 especially around renovation of the toilets (800,000 THB) and Li Hall ceiling (578,000 THB). The Karen Ministry will see the remainder of the cost outlay for construction of the Volunteer House (2.8 m THB), and this is reflected in the budget. The ministry cashflow is expected to be balanced otherwise.

As I expect we are all aware, the most significant financial issue in the near to mid-term will be the restoration of the church sanctuary. This will be addressed as a separate initiative as it is much more significant than the day-to-day operations of our Church.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To The Parish Church Council of *CHRIST CHURCH BANGKOK(ENGLISH)*

I have audited the financial statements of *CHRIST CHURCH BANGKOK(ENGLISH)* (the Church), which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2025, the statement of revenue and expense, and the statement of change in net assets for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In my opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Church as at December 31, 2025, and its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with Thai Financial Reporting Standard for Non-Publicly Accountable Entities.

Basis for Opinion

I conducted my audit in accordance with Thai Standards on Auditing. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of my report. I am independent of the Church in accordance with the *Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants including Independence Standards* issued by the Federation of Accounting Professions (Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants) that are relevant to my audit of the financial statements, and I have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Responsibilities of Committee and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Committee is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Thai Financial Reporting Standard for Non-Publicly Accountable Entities, and for such internal control as committee determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, committee is responsible for assessing the Church's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless committee either intends to liquidate the Church or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so. Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Church's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Thai Standards on Auditing will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Thai Standards on Auditing, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Church's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by committee.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of committee's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Church's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Church to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with committee regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.

1. BASIS OF PREPARATION OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Financial statements have been prepared in accordance with TFRS standards for Non Publicly Accountable Entities (2022) enunciated under the Thai Accounting Profession Act B.E. 2547. The presentation of the financial statements has been made in compliance with the stipulations of the Notification of the Department of Business Development dated on 2023, issued under the Thai Accounting Profession Act B.E. 2543.

During year 2022, Federation of Accounting Profession ("FAP")'s announcement No., 48/2565 dated on November 14, 2022 allow Church to adopt Thai financial Report Standards for Non-Publicly Accountable Entities (TFRS for NPAEs) (2022) which effective for accounting period beginning on or after 1 January 2023.

During year 2024, Church committee agreed to change in accounting policy to prepare the financial statement in accordance with TFRS standards for Non Publicly Accountable Entities (2022).

2. GENERAL INFORMATION

Christ Church is an Anglican church in Bangkok (CCB-English Section), Thailand and is a part of parish of the Anglican Church in Thailand within the Diocese of Singapore. It is English language congregation section located on 11 Convent road, Silom, Bangrak, Bangkok, Thailand. It is a non profit organization which committed to many charitable activities.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Significant accounting policies adopted by the Church are summarized as follows :-

3.1 Support and Revenue recognition and expenses

Offering and Facilitated Donation

Offering and Facilitated donation are recognised in the statement of Revenue and Expenses as they accrue.

Interest Income

Interest income is recognised in the statement of Revenue and Expense as it accrues.

Cost and expenses

Cost of service and expenses are recognised in the statement of revenue and expense as they accrue.

3.2 Cash and Cash Equivalent

Cash and Cash equivalents consist of Cash on hand and deposit in Financial institutions which are current account, saving account, and less than three month deposit.


3.3 Equipment (Net)



Wardens Report Annual General meeting 2025-2026

The Wardens' Report for the 2025-2026 Annual General Meeting at Christ Church Bangkok.

Vicar's Warden: Chris Rajakarier was appointed by Rev. Norman Jones and has continued to serve alongside with Rev. Tim Eady during his tenure as Interim Vicar.

People's Warden: Robin Shell was elected as People's Warden at the Annual General Meeting on May 11, 2025, and stepped down in August 2025. Lianna Ogan has since succeeded Robin, taking on the role in September 2025.

1. The Wardens have collaborated closely with the Vicars, reviewing church matters on a monthly basis. We are grateful for CCB's blessed year in 2025, during which we were fortunate to be served by two dedicated Interim Vicars. A special thanks to Rev. Norman Jones, who served with us until August 2025, and to Rev. Tim Eady, who began his service in September 2025. We valued the opportunity to work closely alongside both Vicars, helping to ensure the church's operations continued smoothly and harmoniously.
2. **PCC meeting:** The PCC meetings were held as scheduled and mainly in person on a regular basis.
3. **Appointment of Interim Vicar:** Together with the rest of the PCC and Diocese, we recruited Rev Norman Jones to serve as Interim Vicar on a 9-month contract (extendable by mutual consent) which ended in the summer of 2025 and following which we recruited Rev Tim Eady from September 2025 for 9 months.
4. The PCC has supported the Interim Vicar in restarting the Alpha Course and Confirmation classes, recognising their role in nurturing the congregation's spiritual growth and development. These programs are progressing smoothly, facilitated by experienced church leaders.
5. **Collaborating with the Interim vicar;** the wardens held regular monthly meeting with the vicar, plus occasional extra one-off meetings. to effectively manage and plan church activities
6. **Enhanced Communication:** Following up on some recommendations made, the PCC re-introduced the practice of providing a summary of key decisions taken at each PCC meeting in the weekly church bulletin distributed to all congregants at the Sunday services to promoting greater transparency and fostering trust within the church community. Rev Tim writes a update from the vicar in the weekly bulletin
7. **Launch of Parish Newsletter:** A parish newsletter was also introduced in January 2025 and a second edition in March, following the recruitment of Rev Tim who has replaced the Parish Newsletter with a weekly update from the Vicar to the congregation.
8. **Vicarage Maintenance:** Some repairs were carried out to the vicarage as needed to ensure a safe comfortable resident for our vicar.
9. **Maintenance and upkeep of the church:** We are collaborating with our ground and maintenance teams to address the needs of our 120-year-old church building, A few repairs were carried out to the main church building. It was noted that small cracks have appeared to be slightly widening due to uneven sinking of the ground. Therefore, thorough investigations have been carried out and quotations given for major renovation. This is being done in close collaboration with the Royal Thai Government (RTG) department of Fine Arts responsible for the maintenance and preservation of listed historic building of which our 120-year-old church building is one. **The Restoration of the Church:** which would require a major renovation. The project will be done in phases over several years, so to minimize disruption. A dedicated fundraising campaign will be supporting on the significant costs involved, which will be planned following the review and findings by Mr Watanyoo Thephuttee from the Architectural firm Kudakahn Co, Ltd. **Please note: Detail report on the fabric, goods, and ornaments of Christ Church can be found in the Ground committee**
10. **The Church Budget: Please note: An estimate of the cost of maintaining the buildings and grounds of the church and providing for the ministries of the church for the current year can be found in the Treasurer's report and will be presented by the Treasurer on behalf of the Wardens**
11. **Election Process & Recommendations- Working group** Following the May election few congregation members expressed concerns regarding aspects of the voting process, including ballot handling, the visibility of the count, and the clarity of procedures communicated at the AGM. In response the PCC enabled a dedicated working group which include members of the congregation to establish a comprehensive election guidelines. This committee was tasked with developing a robust

framework and recommended that future elections be conducted in accordance with the **Christ Church Bangkok Election Guidelines**, with particular emphasis on transparency, anonymity, and clear communication in advance of the AGM. These measures are intended to strengthen confidence and ensure a process that is fair, open, and accountable to the whole congregation. The completed guidelines are now available for reference on the church website at https://www.christchurchbangkok.org/files/ugd/749a2f_fc53db12361e42969e01a735afc563d4.pdf

12. **Li Hall Toilets:** Plans for renovations of the Li Hall and church toilets are currently underway. We have received several contractor quotations and exploring the best suitable options.
13. **Renovation of the Sala:** The renovations at the Sala House have been completed. The space is now ready and available for meetings and training purposes.
14. **AED/defibrillator unit:** The PCC has invested in an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) to enhance the welfare and safety of our congregation, particularly providing reassurance for our elderly members. The unit has now been installed, and training sessions in both English and Thai have been conducted for relevant personnel.
15. **PCC prayer.** Monthly PCC prayer took place as scheduled
16. **PCC Retreat:** together with the Vicar the wardens' facilitated PCC Retreat in January 2026 provided an opportunity for reflection on key areas of church life, including strengthening relationships, enhancing welcome and fellowship, sharing the gospel among the English speaking Thais and Expats, and supporting children, youth, and young adults. Discussions also focused on creating attendance encouraging greater congregational participation and supporting the spiritual growth of the congregation
17. **Vicar Search Committee:** The PCC formed a Vicar's search committee to recruit a permanent Vicar.
18. **Our Pastoral Care:** The PCC facilitated The Pastoral Care Committee offers compassionate support to those navigating difficult challenges. It addresses spiritual, emotional, and psychological needs through listening, prayer, companionship, comfort, and practical assistance during crises.
19. **Children and Youth Ministry:** The Vicar's Warden worked with the Vicar in recruiting a new Children and Youth Ministry leader. The PCC has appointed Ms. Evelyn Cho
20. **Meeting with leadership of the Thai Congregation:** The Vicar, Christ Church English the Pastor of the Thai Congregation and the Wardens of both Congregation met regularly to foster relationship and improve communication.
21. **Rainbow Land Community Development Centre (RCDC) – Stakeholder Engagement:** Regular meeting with the Thai Congregation leadership is working towards a better relationship with the Rainbow land Community Development Centre (RCDC) reaffirming operational responsibilities, ensuring continued transparency and review agreed procedures for its management and maintenance.

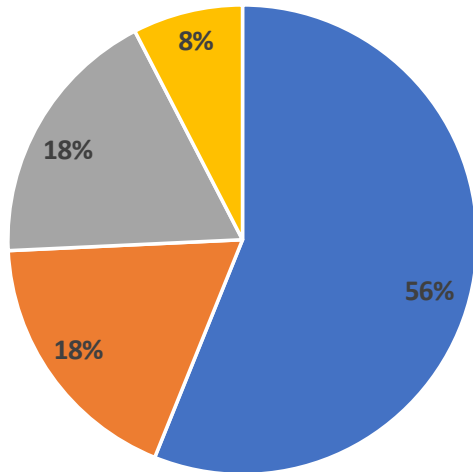

2026 Budget Breakdown



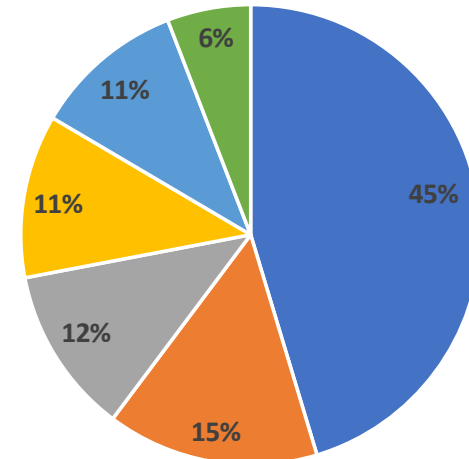

AGM report from Children and Youth Ministry 2025-2026

Thanks to the dedication and support of our many volunteers, teachers, and church leaders, we have experienced a fruitful and encouraging year. The following report outlines the work God has done through this ministry in 2025–2026. We express our sincere thanks to the Children and Youth Ministry Chair, Chris Rajakarier, and the dedicated committee members for their commitment in ensuring that Lighthouse Ministry continued to function smoothly during the period without a Youth and Children’s Ministry Coordinator, prior to the appointment of Evelyn Cho towards the end of October.

Goals

The following goals were set by Children and Youth Ministry Leaders for the year 2025-2026.

Objective 1: Volunteers

- **Objective expanded:** We aim to recruit more volunteers in the Children and Youth classes from members of our congregation, especially those who are looking to stay in Bangkok long term.
- **Actions taken:** We reviewed and updated the child protection documents, induction documents for teacher assistants and helpers and the paperwork required for new volunteers. These changes were made to improve clarity around what information is needed and why, with a strong focus on ensuring the safety of the children and youth.

Induction and Child protection Training: The training process helps new volunteers understand their responsibilities and the importance of these safety measures before they begin serving. In October, we also held a training and Induction session for all volunteers, which welcomed three new members to the ministry team. Next Child Protection and induction training is on the 22nd of March 2026. Annual youth and children ministry meeting was conducted in February 2026 with teachers, teacher assistants and other volunteers for year-end review and suggestions.

Objective 2: Incorporation

- **Objective expanded:** We aim to incorporate the Children and Youth ministry into the broader church life in order to benefit both parties and to help the next generation of church leaders to know what it means to be involved in the church.
- **Actions taken:** Throughout the year, the Children and Youth ministry actively participated in various aspects of church life. Children and youth were involved in several Sunday services, including special events such as the Nativity and Easter services, as well as Youth and Young Adults services. Youth and their families from Lighthouse supported the church's outreach efforts by participating in a bake sale to raise funds for the Karen Ministry. The young people played a key role in organizing the booths and selling items during the event.
- Within our ministry structure, we have also adjusted the morning schedule to include a time where children and youth gather together. This time encourages connection and provides opportunities for youth to take on leadership roles, fostering a stronger sense of ownership and involvement. The children performed Christian action songs on first Sunday of every month at the main service starting from February 2026.

Objective 3: Partnership

- **Objective expanded:** We aim to partner alongside parents and guardians in support of the God given role they fill. We aim to teach and support families in order to see the youth and children better know God.
- **Actions taken:** We strengthened connections with families by regularly communicating through Lighthouse Parents Whatsapp group chat and a Children's Summer Program. These events encouraged unity, open communication, and active family involvement in the spiritual growth of children and youth.

Lighthouse Children's Ministry:

Curriculum:

We continue to use the Urban Saints Energize curriculum, a resource we have relied on for several years. It provides structured, age-appropriate materials that support both teaching and spiritual development. The curriculum allows the ministry leader to plan the syllabus in advance, making it easier for teachers to prepare their individual classes. Our annual subscription was renewed in March 2025 and is valid for one year.

Registration:

Over the past year, we made two key improvements to our registration system to enhance safety and organization. First, we relocated the registration table closer to the class rooms, ensuring children are safely transferred directly to teachers after drop-off. Second, we introduced a new system using Google Forms to manage registrations more efficiently. This updated process has improved administration for both Lighthouse and Tiny Tots, including better inventory tracking, organized storage, and the creation of an online registration system. These procedures are now clearly outlined in a dedicated registration manual. Following registration the children attend church for story time and return to the classes.

Acknowledgements and Team Support (2025–2026):

The Lighthouse, Children, and Youth Ministry flourished this year thanks to the dedication of 25 teachers, the Administration Team, PCC Committee members, helpers, and parents. We are also deeply grateful for the ongoing support from the Lighthouse team, PCC members, our Vicar, and the wider church community.

Grounds, Maintenance, and Security Committee Report

Christ Church Bangkok – AGM 2026

Introduction

The Grounds, Maintenance, and Security Committee is tasked with ensuring the safety, functionality, and appearance of Christ Church Bangkok's facilities. This report summarizes our objectives and key activities over the past year.

Objectives

At the beginning of the year, the committee set out to:

- Continue and advance the church building restoration and conservation project.
 - Progress renovation of key Li Hall facilities, including restrooms and ceiling.
 - Identify and address maintenance and safety concerns across the compound.
 - Obtain quotations for priority projects and present them for PCC approval.
 - Oversee implementation of approved projects.

Summary of Work Completed

Over the past year, the committee:

- Made significant progress on the main church building conservation project, culminating in a formal preliminary cost estimation and project master schedule.
 - Advanced the Li Hall restroom renovation project through vendor evaluation and TOR development.
 - Initiated planning for the Li Hall ceiling renovation.
 - Upgraded the sewer cover behind the kitchen to improve safety.
 - Continued regular inspections and addressed day-to-day maintenance needs across the compound.

Church Building Conservation Project

Following PCC approval, conservation architect Mr. Watanyoo Thephuttee (Kudakahn) was engaged for a full site survey and engineering analysis of the main church building. This work has produced a comprehensive conservation study covering three restoration approaches — ranging from urgent structural repairs through to a full restoration, with the most extensive option also addressing the building's underlying settlement and tilt through underpinning and leveling.

The field survey and research phase is now largely complete. The conservation design phase is expected to run through 2026, with construction timelines and costs varying significantly depending on which approach the PCC selects. Preliminary cost estimates

have been produced for each approach and will be presented to the PCC alongside a recommendation and a proposal for the fundraising strategy required to move forward.

Li Hall Restroom Renovation

The restrooms in Li Hall are in poor condition and require renovation. A Terms of Reference was developed and issued to contractors, covering lighting, ventilation, drainage, water supply, and full interior renovation of the men's, women's, and accessible restrooms.

Five contractors submitted proposals, which were evaluated against eight weighted criteria including price, TOR compliance, design quality, accessibility, and construction methodology. A preferred contractor has been identified and final selection and contract award are in progress. **Work is expected to commence this summer.**

Li Hall Ceiling Renovation

In parallel with the restroom renovation, the committee has begun developing a Terms of Reference for the renovation of the Li Hall ceiling. Planning is in progress, and **work is expected to commence this summer.**

Other Maintenance and Safety Works

Sewer cover upgrade (behind kitchen): The old wooden sewer cover behind the kitchen was replaced with a steel cover. This addresses a safety concern and provides a more durable, long-term solution.

Ongoing maintenance: The committee has continued to carry out regular inspections and address maintenance needs across the compound as they arise, including plumbing, drainage, and general facilities upkeep.

Challenges and Ongoing Work

The scale and complexity of the church building conservation project presents the committee's most significant challenge ahead. Determining the appropriate restoration approach, securing the necessary funding, and managing works with minimal disruption to church life will require careful planning and broad congregational support.

Several projects initiated this year remain in progress, and the committee continues to work on documentation, prioritisation, and completion of approved initiatives.

Conclusion

The committee remains committed to maintaining and improving Christ Church Bangkok's facilities. The coming year will be a pivotal one, with significant renovation work expected to commence across multiple projects and important decisions to be made regarding the long-term conservation of our historic church building. We look forward to reporting further progress at the 2027 AGM.

Our Vision: *“To provide spiritual and practical support working towards a greater degree of sustainability & self-reliance”*

Our 4 targets to achieve this year

1. Develop the 10-year strategic sustainability plan for Karen Ministry
2. Broaden the involvement of CCB congregation
3. Prepare a one-year budget to ensure greater transparency and accountability
4. Buildings, Renovations, and Maintenance – Build the volunteer accommodation and continue general maintenance

During the year under review, the Ministry has advanced key priorities in strategic planning, community engagement, financial accountability, and infrastructure development, while responding to ongoing environmental and operational challenges.

Strategic Priorities and Progress

1. Target 1: Development of a 10-Year Strategic Plan

The Ministry remains committed to a long-term vision of sustainability and self-reliance. Progress has been made through structured stakeholder engagement, including regular consultation with staff and the formation of smaller working groups to support implementation and local ownership.

Change management within a multicultural context has been approached with care, ensuring ongoing dialogue, trust-building, and feedback mechanisms. While progress has been impacted by external factors—including the effects of the pandemic, flooding, and livestock disease—the strategic direction remains clear and active.

The Ministry remains committed to a long-term vision of sustainability and self-reliance for Noh Bo Academy.

Key areas of sustainability development include:

- **Food Security:**
Chicken farming and Pig farming continues to provide both nutritional benefit and modest income. Agricultural activities contributed positively to student nutrition. Due

- **Water Management:** Continue to increase and implement rainwater harvesting systems, with further work planned to expand water storage and explore additional clean water supply solutions.
- **Infrastructure (Shelter):** Incremental improvements to accommodation and classroom facilities continue, aligned with long-term development goals.
- **Education:** Accreditation, increasing access to recognised educational pathways

A sustainability learning visit to the Mechai Foundation in Buriram provided valuable insights, and opportunities for future collaboration are being explored in 2025. We are waiting on Noh Bo staff to complete their documentation to enable them to travel and learn how this system works.

Future Priorities: Accreditation

As part of this strategy, increasing access to recognised educational pathways for students has become a key area of development.

One important initiative under consideration is the introduction of the **General Educational Development (GED)** programme as an alternative academic pathway for students. The GED is a United States–based, internationally recognised high school equivalency qualification, widely accepted by universities and employers, including within Thailand. The GED curriculum consists of four core subject areas: Reasoning through Language Arts (RLA), Mathematical reasoning, Science, Social Studies.

The programme is administered by the GED Testing Service, a joint initiative of the American Council on Education and Pearson, and is internationally accredited. Successful completion provides students with a qualification equivalent to a high school diploma, enabling access to further education, including international university pathways.

The potential introduction of the GED programme aligns with the Ministry’s broader strategic objectives by:

- Expanding educational opportunities for students
- Providing internationally recognised qualifications
- Supporting long-term self-reliance through improved career and study prospects

This initiative is currently being explored as part of the wider strategic development plan. Explore and, where feasible, implement the **GED (General Educational Development) programme** as an alternative academic pathway, providing students with access to an internationally recognised high school equivalency qualification and expanding opportunities for further education and employment.

The introduction of this programme will require investment in teaching resources, training, and examination fees. We therefore invite members of the congregation and supporters to consider contributing towards this initiative. Supporting a student through the GED programme is a meaningful way to invest in their future, equipping them with recognised qualifications and opening doors to greater opportunities.

We are grateful for your continued generosity and partnership in supporting the educational

2. Target 2: Broadening Congregational Engagement

Efforts have been made to strengthen engagement with the Christ Church Bangkok (CCB) congregation through:

- Organised volunteer visits to ministry locations
- Participation in key events such as student graduations
- Support from visiting international teams
- Ongoing fundraising initiatives, including concerts and community events.

Communication with the congregation has been enhanced through regular updates, including video messages and ministry materials. The continued generosity of the congregation, both financially and through practical donations, is gratefully acknowledged.

3. Target 3: Financial Transparency and Accountability

The Ministry has continued to strengthen its financial governance through:

- Improved budgeting and regular financial reporting
- Closer coordination between CCB and local ministry leadership
- Development of administrative systems to support accountability and oversight

Training and supervision of local staff remain a priority to ensure sustainable and transparent financial management.

4. Target 4: Buildings, Renovations, and Maintenance

Significant progress has been made in infrastructure development:

- **Volunteer Accommodation (The Volunteer House):**
The previous volunteer accommodation had deteriorated significantly due to termite infestation, requiring ongoing repairs that were no longer sustainable. In addition, there has been a decline in long-term volunteers, highlighting the need for improved facilities.
- In response, the Karen Ministry has undertaken the redevelopment of the Volunteer House to provide safe and suitable accommodation for visiting volunteers. The new facility is also designed to function as a retreat and guest house, offering opportunities for supplementary income and supporting the long-term sustainability of the ministry. It is anticipated that improved accommodation will encourage an increase in long-term volunteers who can contribute to teaching, development initiatives, and local enterprise.
- The former structure has been demolished, with reusable materials repurposed to construct a home for the Sustainability Officer and his family. Construction of the new Volunteer House is progressing well, with the main structural work largely completed and the roof now in place. Electrical planning is currently underway.
- The facility will support volunteers and provide potential supplementary income as a guest or retreat space. Building is progressing well accommodation and hope to have it completed by this summer. We ask for continued support and prayer as this project moves towards completion.

Other: Buildings, Renovations, and Maintenance

- **Kitchen and Dining Facilities:**
Renovation and elevation works have improved resilience to flooding and created a multi-purpose space for training and community use.
- **Cooking Facilities:**
The introduction of gas cooking systems represents a step forward in health and hygiene, with ongoing training required to support adoption.
- **Library:**
The relocation and upgrading of the library have improved accessibility and created a more conducive learning environment.
- **Girls' dormitory:**
The girls' dormitory is currently in a poor state of repair, with significant deterioration of the bamboo wall structures resulting in large gaps. This has impacted the safety, privacy, and overall living conditions of the residents. We are looking for donors to fund this, seeking donations in the amount of **373,000 Baht** to carry out essential repairs and upgrades.

This work is necessary to provide a safe, secure, and appropriate living environment, ensuring that the dignity and wellbeing of the girls are properly maintained.



- **General Maintenance:**
Ongoing works include classroom sealing, termite treatment, and structural improvements.
- **Water Systems:**
Rainwater collection systems have been installed, with further expansion planned as water supply remains a key priority.

Karen Ministry – Mae La Camp Support

Overview

As part of its wider mission, the Karen Ministry continues to provide ongoing support to the Karen community in Mae La Camp. Located approximately five kilometres north of Mae Sot, Mae La is the largest refugee camp for the displaced Karen community and is home to over 40,000 people, including a significant number of children.

Christ Church Bangkok remains committed to offering both practical and spiritual support within this context, particularly through education, child welfare, and ministry partnerships.

2. The Three Nurseries:



Nursery Schools

Mae La Camp is home to three Anglican churches Emmanuel, St John's, Trinity. Each of which operates a preschool supported by Christ Church Bangkok. Collectively, these nurseries care for approximately 309 young children.

The Number of Nursery School Students and Teachers in 2025-2026:

Support provided includes:

- Provision of food
- Contribution towards staff salaries
- Supply of teaching materials
- Basic care items such as sleeping mats

This support plays an essential role in ensuring that young children receive care, early education, and stability in a challenging environment.

3. Orphanage –St Johns:

Christ Church Bangkok also supports St John's Orphanage within Mae La Camp, which provides care for approximately 36 children. Assistance is given towards food and daily living necessities, helping to ensure that the children are cared for in a safe and supportive environment. There are (36) students, (19) boys and (17) girls in this orphanage, and they are looked after by (2) supervisors.

Report of the Outreach Committee April 2025-6

The purpose of this team is to assist the Vicar in providing pastoral care for members of CCB congregation and to respond to requests for help that are made to the office or directly to the Vicar.

Examples of different types of activity:

Praying with people if they would like to have someone pray with them. Organising practical assistance if needed,

Arranging visits in response to calls from people facing crisis, whether practical (such as running out of money, being evicted from their home, visa problems) or spiritual and emotional (such as depression, family disputes, desire to find meaning in life)

Regular visitation to members of congregation who are sick or otherwise unable to get to church. Home and hospital visits, as necessary.

Keeping an eye out at church services for people who look lonely or look like they would welcome someone to talk and /or pray with.

Intercessory prayer from people receiving this” pastoral” assistance,

This year the Pastoral Care Team received many prayer requests.

We had prayer requests for families who had lost loved ones.

Hospital visits were made with care baskets sent to people who were sick or injured.

The Pastoral Care Team will continue to pray and give comfort to people who request it .

All requests to the team are treated as confidential

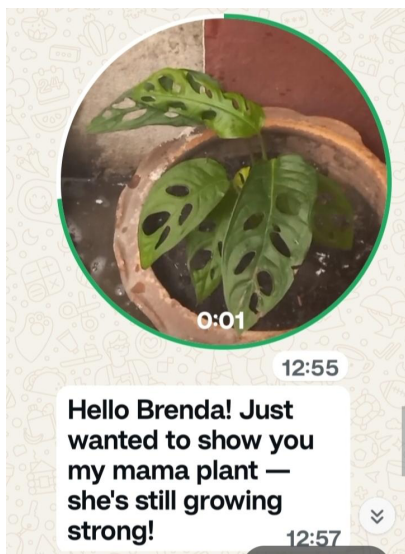
